I walked into the office and apologized for the intrusion and introduced myself, "Hey there, I'm David Babic, It's nice to meet you." Jack looked up at me with a curious twinkle in his eye.. He said, "Did you ski in a Warren Miller film?.." I was blown away that he recognized me.. I was truly caught me off guard. I would later learn that his family would drive up from Boston every weekend to ski at Sugarbush.
